Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time! The theme this Sunday centers around being humble in order to have empathy for others. In the first reading from the Book of Sirach, we are told that an arrogant heart produces a sharp tongue towards others. "The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had, so too does one's speech disclose the best of one's mind." Then in the second reading from First Corinthians, Paul encourages the faithful to always rely on God to conquer sin and death through Jesus Christ. "Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters, be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." And finally in Luke's gospel, Jesus is teaching his disciples about the importance of humility and how they should look at their own behavior before judging that of others. "For every tree is known by its own fruit."

What's wrong with the world? We hear most often the phrase: "I've never seen it this bad." When it comes to the state of the world, people often forget how bad things were at other times. Each generation feels their problems are greater than those of past generations. Yet, people are honestly concerned with many things in our present age. Maybe it's the rapid advancing technologies, changing attitudes toward moral issues, concern over fewer people getting married, smaller families, the behavior of other countries, decrease in church attendance, decrease in belief, the economic state of the country, the increase in crime. What is wrong with the world? And also, nearly everyone seems to be concerned with a large number of people being a bit angrier, less intelligent, less reasonable, greedier and all sorts of not-so-great stuff. The gossip mill churns and spits out a lot for our consumption. Instead of sharing ideas we vent our disappointments in the way things are going. We have disappointments in political decisions, policies, elections, in world events and various crises around the globe, financial disappointment and maybe most of all disappointment in other people. The decisions other people may mess things up and steer us down unhealthy and dangerous paths. But you know what? All I point out that is wrong in the world has nothing to do with me! "How can you say to your brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye, when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye?"

When we can't even admit and understand our own need for change, our own failings that make the world less than it can be; no one will be drawn to us. If we just continuously point out the faults and weaknesses of others, all we are really doing is pulling away from and pushing others away from faith. Lots of things are wrong with the world. And for each of us it all starts with one-self.

Ready or not, here we go! The beginning of Lent starts on Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025. Ashes will be distributed at all the Masses, 7:15am, 8:45am, 12:15pm, 7:30pm, and also at a special 4pm Prayer Service in the church. Starting on Ash Wednesday there will be an additional daily Mass celebrated at 12:15pm on all the weekdays of Lent. The Stations of the Cross will also be prayed starting Friday, March 7th at 7pm and on each of the succeeding Fridays of Lent. The bulletin will also contain the dates and times of all additional prayer gatherings during the Lenten season.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the schedule for Ash Wednesday, an invitation to the St. **Patrick's Party** on Saturday, March 22 (sponsored by the Knights of Columbus), an ad for the upcoming Mom and Son Mass and Dance on Saturday, March 29th, the *Eucharistic Revival Center*fold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join **FORMED** (your Catholic Faith on demand that is chock full of Lenten programming) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great beginning to Lent! Smile, share, get your Lenten smile going and remember: Lent is spring training for Christians, so we'll be ready for opening day-Easter Sunday!



Abstinence and fasting

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat/poultry on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired and excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

fast and abstinence.

Holy Communion Part 2

We continue our discussion from last week of Holy Communion, also known as the Eucharist. The Eucharist is a powerful reminder of Christ's ultimate sacrifice for humanity.

In the act of sharing bread and wine, Christians commemorate Jesus' body and blood given on the cross for the forgiveness of sins. This sacrament, instituted by Christ during the Last Supper, symbolizes His sacrifice as a means of reconciliation between God and mankind. Through Communion, believers participate in a sacred mystery, uniting spiritually with Christ, acknowledging His suffering, and accepting His grace. It is not merely a ritual but a profound encounter with the living Christ, whose selfless act of love continues to bring salvation to all who partake.

Participating in Christ's Perfect Sacrifice



As highlighted last week, Fr. Guy Oury, author of "The Mass," tells us how sacrifice and Holy Communion fit together in the Mass. This becomes clearer if we look at meals and feasts in Jewish history. According to Fr. Oury, "In the [Traditional Jewish] meal God is present as a tablemate, invisible to be sure but still present. He lives with human beings, shares their common interests, and welcomes them as intimates. People are the invited of God... At the time of Christ, the image of a feast was one of the most common to portray the kingdom that was to come. The Lord used it

repeatedly in the parables. It stood for the kingdom of heaven both in the terrestrial form that is the Church and in the ultimate and definitive form that is paradise. The Eucharist itself was instituted in the context of a sacred meal, that of Passover" (The Mass, pp. 105-6).

The Greatest Celebration of All Time



See how Holy Communion is so much more than just a meal? True, it is a Sacred Meal, Holy Thursday, the Last Supper, where we are guests of the Lord, who gives of his very self for our nourishment. But, this meal is also the sacrifice of the Cross, where our sins are overcome and conquered once and for all. The meal is also an anticipation of the heavenly banquet, where we will celebrate with the Lord and the Communion of Saints forever.

Finally, this special meal is also a means of unity among the faithful—the Body of Christ, the Church. With all this meaning, the Eucharist is the greatest celebration of all time. Not only are we present at this wonderful celebration, but many of us are also invited to receive the Lord in the Eucharist. In the weeks ahead, we will look more closely at receiving Communion properly, who can receive Communion, different forms of Holy Communion, and what to do when we aren't able to receive Our Lord.

For Reflection: Deepen your awareness of the Old Testament ritual feasts that prepared the way for Christ as described in Leviticus (see Lev 23). Discuss with your family or community how to strengthen the centrality of the Mass in your weekly or daily life.



The "dreaded complication" abortionists try to cover up, and the media doesn't report, occurs when a baby survives the gruesome abortion procedure and is born alive. Melissa Ohden, founder of Abortion Survivors Network, stated that the data the Network has, indicates, that since 1973, approximately 85,817 infants have been born alive after a failed abortion and about 1,734 infants survive abortions each year. What happens to those infants? In Melissa's case, at 31 weeks in utero, her mother was forced, by her family, to have an abortion. Melissa was subjected to the saline abortion (a salt solution injected into the amniotic sac, poisoning and burning the infant over a prolonged period until death). Melissa survived the abortion and the nurse who delivered her demanded that Melissa be left to die. Tragically, that nurse, was Melissa's grandmother. However, one of the other nurses rushed Melissa to the NICU, saying, "She just kept gasping for breath, and so I couldn't just leave her there to die." Melissa was one of the fortunate ones. Her life was spared. However, in a 2019 Minnesota report on abortions, it was reported that 3 babies survived their abortions. The report stated that "no measures taken to preserve life and infant did not survive," or "comfort care measures were provided as planned and the infant did not survive." They and many others were not as fortunate as Melissa. Recently the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, which would have protected those infants who survive an abortion, was not passed. Every attempt to to expand abortion survivor protections have been voted down by proabortion politicians. They claim that these laws would be harmful restrictions on abortion. But what about the survivors who are living, breathing human beings? St. John Paul Il rightly called this abortion culture - "The Culture of Death." 




