

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time! We are in the jubilee year of 2025 which is a time for rejoicing and festivity. Today's readings are all about rejoicing. In the first reading from the prophet Nehemiah, the people of Israel have finally been freed from their 50 -year exile by the Babylonians. They are sad and weary, but the prophet tells them that today is a holy day to God. "Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the Lord must be your strength." Then in the second reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians, the people of Corinth are encouraged to be supportive of each other and united in being one body in Jesus Christ. Joys and sorrows should all be shared by each person. Unity is the key. "For in one spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one spir*it.*" And finally, we have the beginning of Luke's gospel where Jesus, having grown up, returns to Nazareth, and reads the scripture in the temple that proclaims the jubilee that is to come someday. But when finished reading, Jesus surprises everyone when he adds his own words: "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Unity is not an easy thing to achieve. Nor is it an easy thing to maintain. It can be hard to maintain in families, workplaces, on teams and in all sorts of interactions. Just look at our country. The United States has struggled to live up to its name (the *United* States), and not just recently. From the very beginning it has been a struggle, once boiling over into a civil war of tremendous cruelty and hatred. And we're still fighting the same battle over 150 years later. Unity is a lot more difficult than it might seem in theory. The Jewish people spoken about in the first reading relied on their trust in God, no matter what was happening, that would unite them, as a nation, a people, a faith. This same bond of unity remains for many Jewish people to this day.



But what about Catholics? Are we united? We should be, shouldn't we? We all claim to follow the same God, the same Lord, the same Savior. We all accept Jesus as the *"anointed one"* the person we are to know, love and follow. "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." Yet somehow, we find a way to have all sorts of ideas as to who this Jesus is, what he was about, and what he expects from us. We sort of make him whoever we want him to be, whatever fits our worldview, our biases, our politics. It's the only way I can explain all the divisiveness, the deep mistrust, the contempt, the ridicule and judging. We often act as if we are not on the same team, on the same mission, in the same family. Indeed, we often don't seem very united.

Unity comes about only when we value one another, recognize each other's gifts, and join the best in each of us together-all in service to God as a whole, as his body, as a faith community. Embracing this truth will get us to realize the foolishness in always judging each other, believing our ways are the best, the wisest. Our attitudes must more truly resemble that of God, who sees us the same, graces us the same, challenges us to the same, and loves us the same. Maybe then true unity won't be that far off.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), a registration form for the Valentine's Sweetheart Mass and Dance on Saturday, February 8th, an ad for the celebration of World Marriage Day on Sunday February 9th, invitations to join our St. Raymond's Adult Choir and St. Raymond's Folk Group, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great week. Smile, share, strive for real unity. Plus remember: If only we fought just as hard to understand as we fought to disagree. God bless always.

READINGS FOR TODAY'S MASS

JANUARY 26, 2025-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FIRST READING Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

Ezra the priest brought the law before the assembly, which consisted of men, women. and those children old enough to understand. Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, he read out of the book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand; and all the people listened attentively to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden platform that had been made for the occasion. He opened the scroll so that all the people might see it— for he was standing higher up than any of the people -; and, as he opened it, all the people rose. Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people, their hands raised high, answered, "Amen, amen!" Then they bowed down and prostrated themselves before the LORD, their faces to the ground. Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people: "Today is holy to the LORD your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep"-for all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law. He said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 12:12-14, 27

Brothers and sisters: As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit. Now the body is not a single part, but many. You are Christ's body, and individually parts of it.

Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received. Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all. He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord. Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."



Preparation of the Priest – Part 1



As we continue our final preparation for receiving Communion, we may notice another time when it looks as if the priest may be talking to himself at the altar. Actually, he is praying! After the "Lamb of God," the congregation kneels down in adoration of THE Lamb of God present on the altar–Jesus Christ really, truly, and substantially present. Meanwhile, the priest joins his hands, perhaps bowing slightly, speaks quietly to himself, genuflects, and then gets ready for the next part of the Mass. What is he doing?

This part of the Mass is called the private preparation of the priest for receiving Holy Communion. As is often the case, the name of this part of



the Mass tells you exactly what is happening! Before Communion, the priest takes a few moments to prepare to receive Our Lord. According to the Diocese of Peoria, after the fraction rite, "the priest prays a prayer quietly to himself. This is done quietly because it is a personal prayer of the priest as he prepares for communion.

The sacrament of the Eucharist is the only Sacrament a priest can administer to himself. This private prayer asks the Lord to forgive any faults and to keep him faithful to the teachings of the Church... After this private preparation, the priest genuflects in adoration" (A Study of the Mass, p. 19).

The Two Prayers of Preparation

The Roman Missal actually gives the priest two options for this private prayer, both equally beautiful and prayerful:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, who, by the will of the Father and the work of the Holy Spirit, through your Death gave life to the world, free me by this, your most holy Body and Blood, from all my sins and from every evil; keep me always faithful to your commandments, and never let me be parted from you.

0r ...

May the receiving of your Body and Blood, Lord Jesus Christ, not bring me to judgment and condemnation, but through your loving mercy be for me protection in mind and body and a healing remedy.



Fr. Guy Oury observes that "the first of the two prayers begins the reminiscence of Peter's confession at Caesarea Philippi and alludes to the Passion, which Christ foretold shortly after. The Eucharist is offered to us as an antidote to sin. It is, by Christ's own will, the favored means of union with him" (The Mass, p. 116). The second prayer, while shorter, also reminds the priest just how much he needs our Lord in the Eucharist and calls him to strive to be a worthy and holy priest.

For Reflection: Watch for the private preparation of the priest when you participate in Mass. Receive this moment as an opportunity to pray for the celebrant, for yourself, and for all present as you prepare for Communion.




