Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the **Second Sunday in Ordinary Time!** Today's gospel of the Wedding Feast at Cana is where Jesus performs his first public miracle. In the first reading from the prophet, Isaiah, the importance of the Chosen People to God is affirmed by Isaiah. When the Messiah comes, Israel will be likened to a bride and there will be much rejoicing because everything will be great. "For the Lord delights in you and makes your land his spouse." Then in the second reading from the First Letter to the Corinthians, Paul speaks about the spiritual gifts that are bestowed upon the faithful by the Holy Spirit. All these gifts are meant to be used in building up God's people, the Church. "To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." And finally, John's familiar gospel about the wedding in Cana heralds a new time as Jesus' public ministry begins. The changing of water into wine signals a new beginning as the guests celebrate a new life for this married couple. This miracle is striking as it comes to signify that God wants to help us not just when we are sick or in need of deliverance from sin. He wants to be part of our new life in Jesus, and he doesn't want it to ever end. Mary's power of intercession is also established as is her message to all of us. "Do whatever he tells you."

Jesus wanted the party to go on for the guests of the newly married couple. In fact, he wanted it to be even better than before. The best was yet to come. Jesus had stepped in and the whole situation was better for it. Jesus was the difference. He got involved and things changed-all for the better. We know that our lives are definitely not one continuous party. Somethings goes right and somethings goes wrong. Someone succeeds and someone fails. Someone gets healed and someone dies. Where is the celebration in all of this? Realize that the things God promises are often not what we think he is promising, not what we want him to promise. The things of God are richer, deeper, more lasting and more meaningful, eternal. So, the joy and the peace God wants for us is often not the kind we think we need. Faith teaches us that the celebration God wants to last forever is really an openness to his grace, an openness that allows God to fill us to the brim with every good thing. And these good gifts do not depend on what goes on around us. Their strength can bring about a kind of lasting, life-changing transformation, a kind of celebration-a party going on within each of us in which true joy, true peace and true hope dominate our lives. When we let God be God, he will show us that the best is yet to come, and there is nothing better or more lasting.

This coming Wednesday, January 22nd is designated by the United States Bishops as a "Day of Prayer for the Legal protection of Unborn Children." We will celebrate a "Mass for Giving Thanks to God for the Gift of Human Life" at the regular 8:45 Mass. All are invited to join in this Mass to pray for this special intention. Then on Friday, January 24th, there will be Eucharistic Adoration, sponsored by our parish's Human Life Committee from 1pm till 4pm in solidarity with the annual March for Life taking place that day in Washington, D.C. There will be Benediction concluding this time of Exposition at 4pm. All are invited to spend this time in prayer for the safety of the unborn.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of addition note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation) including an order form for the Sweetheart Valentine's Mass and Dance on Friday, February 8th, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from— although the servers who had drawn the water knew —, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.



Fraction
Part 2
A Symbol of
Reality

As discussed last week, after the initial breaking of the Host, the priest breaks off a small piece and places it into the chalice. We call this part of the Mass the Fraction Rite or the Breaking and the Commingling.

As the Diocese of Peoria explains, "Placing a piece of the host in the chalice is a very ancient custom dating back to at least the fourth century. Originally, it was designed to show unity and communion between the pope, bishops and their local Churches. Fragments of the host from the Masses celebrated by the pope or bishop were carried by the deacons to the local churches and placed into the chalices during the celebration of the Mass. It symbolized the reality that the entire [C]hurch is present at every Mass.

Even though it is not practiced as such today, the commingling of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ remains a beautiful part of the Communion Rite as it expresses a great reality. When the consecration takes place, the bread and the wine are consecrated separately, for this is how our Lord instituted the memorial sacrifice of His death on the cross. He anticipated how His death would take place: the separation of His Body and Blood and He bled to His death on the cross. The commingling at this point during the Mass symbolizes the Resurrection of Jesus when on the third day His Body and Soul were reunited forever" (Diocese of Peoria: "A Study of the Mass," p. 19).

Reminding us that the whole Christ is present in either/both the Consecrated Host and/or the Chalice, Charles Belmonte writes, "Some say that the separated species signify the Victim in the state of death (the body in one place, the blood in another), whereas in reality our Lord is present in either and in

both species, as he is in heaven, living and glorious. Therefore, the Reminding us that the whole Christ is present in either/both the Consecrated Host and/or the Chalice, Charles Belmonte, the author of "Understanding the Mass" writes, "Some say that the separated species signify the Victim in the state of death (the body in one place, the blood in another), whereas in reality our Lord is present in either and in both species, as he is in heaven, living and glorious. Therefore, the mingling symbolizes the re-union of Christ's body and soul as in his resurrection. It is, however, probable that the mingling must have corresponded to the dogmatic need to show clearly the unity and indivisibility of the body and blood of Jesus Christ" (pp. 179–80).

A Sacrament of Unity

As a priest, I really enjoy thinking about the ancient custom of having the deacon bring a fragment of a host consecrated at Mass by the bishop. Sometimes after the commingling prayer, I will silently say a short prayer for the bishop. I ask the Lord to gift him with wisdom and strength to lead us well. I ask that he be strengthened through reception of the Eucharist and that his heart continue to become more like Christ's. In that moment, this sign of unity recalls me back to ordination day, when priests promise respect and obedience to the bishop and his successors. The Eucharist truly is our sacrament of unity-drawing each of us into greater unity with Christ and with one another.

All that from the Fraction Rite and Commingling! This rite shows us very concretely that there are no parts of the Mass without deep meaning, even gestures that may seem small.

For Reflection: Pay particular attention to the Fraction Rite and Commingling next time you participate in Mass. Pray for your local bishop and for the unity of the local and universal Church.

PILLAR 3 - EUCHARISTIC LIFE

Encouraging missionary disciples to be strengthened and renewed in their Christian identity through the Eucharist, realizing that, as we love Christ more, our lives are configured too

Pillar 3 emphasizes living out the Eucharist in the world by spreading the Good News and fostering a deeper commitment to mission work. One way to live out the Eucharist is "outreach," i.e., encouraging somone to actively share the gift of the Eucharist and the transformative power of the Mass.

Invite Others to Mass

One of the most direct ways to live out outreach is to invite others—friends, family, or neighbors—to attend Mass with you. Many people may not be regularly attending Mass, and your invitation can be a powerful way to introduce them to the joy and grace of the Eucharist. Here are some suggestions to invite someone to Mass:

- Be genuine and friendly: Approach the invitation with a positive attitude and express your genuine desire for them to join you.
- Make it personal: Invite them to come "with you" rather than just saying "come to Mass."
- Be specific: Mention the day, time, and location of the Mass you're attending.
- Consider their comfort level: If they're new to Catholicism, consider suggesting a less formal Mass or offering to accompany them through the service.
- Offer to answer questions: If they have concerns or are unfamiliar with the Catholic Mass, let them know you're happy to explain anything.

The Jubilee Year - Pilgrims of Hope December 24, 2024 - January 6, 2026 WHAT IS A HOLY YEAR?

In the Roman Catholic tradition, a Holy Year, or Jubilee is a great religious event. It is a year of forgiveness of sins and also the punishment due to sin, it is a year of reconciliation between



adversaries, of conversion and receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and consequently of solidarity, hope, justice, commitment to serve God with joy and in peace with our brothers and sisters. A Jubilee year is above all the year of Christ, who brings life and grace to humanity.

The Jubilee Year - Pilgrims of Hope began with the traditional opening of the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024 by Pope Francis and continues until the closing of the Holy Door on January 6, 2026, the solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord.

Pope Francis chose "Pilgrims of Hope" as the theme for the Jubilee Year to emphasize the journey of faith that all Catholics undertake, both individually and collectively, through life. The theme underscores the idea that as pilgrims, we are on a continuous journey toward God, navigating challenges, joys, and moments of grace with the guiding light of hope.

Over the next few weeks we will suggest ways that we can live out the theme of "Pilgrims of Hope" and make the Jubilee Year a transformative period of spiritual renewal and growth.


Food donations can be brought to the Ryan House during its open hours or non-perishable food can be left in the bin on the Ryan House porch or in the Altar Server's Sacristy.




