Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today's readings teach us that whatever we put our trust in will either draw us closer to Jesus or pull us away. In the first reading from the Book of Numbers, we see that God prepares and equips leaders such as Moses and others to guide the Israelites. Moses praises the ways God touches other leaders and prophets. "Would that all the people of the Lord were prophets! Would that the Lord might bestow his spirit on them all!" Then in the second reading from James, we see how being tied to the treasures and pleasures of this world will never satisfy our deepest human needs. Without religion and its teachings, one is lost in a sea of choices that will not carry us through the doorway of death. And finally, Mark's gospel puts our choices in stark contrast. The choices we make that are good will move us closer to Jesus, to goodness and love. But the bad choices we make will only lead us to corrosion and misery. Jesus tells his apostles that there are others who can also lead people to Jesus. "Do not prevent them. "There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me. For whoever is not against us is for us."

Did you know that there is a real job some people have called "influencer?" It is a job description given to certain people who have a significant presence on social media (Instagram, TikTok, etc., and who get paid for promoting certain products and services. Sometimes they are very transparent and overt and sometimes very subtle in their "influencing." Believe it or not, some "influencers" make a lot of money. Now there have always been "influencers" but just not with this title. TV, radio and magazines were littered with well-known people telling us how great cigarettes, beer, white bread and white sugar were for us. No lie, advertising has always been at work trying to increase sales in whatever way they could. Of course, we would never be "influenced" by such promotional stuff. That's for suckers. We would rather be the ones influencing others, getting them to do what we want them to.



But what about God? Today's scriptures seem to present challenges to God on how he should be acting. People were telling Moses and Jesus how they should and could act. They wanted God to play by their rules, so to speak. God seems to have become some sort of commodity, a product to sell to others for their benefit. Do we still treat God that way? How often do we use God to divide rather than bring people together? People should discover the truth in what we say about God, while presuming others have nothing legitimate to say about God. Jesus in the gospel uses dramatic language to show us how important it is for our behavior to change, or our attitudes to change, for us to conform our lives to God's will, not the other way around. That's what the spiritual life is all about. Faithfulness is an openness to letting God transform us into the people he knows we can be. True believers let God be the sole "influencer" in all they say, do and believe. Can you let God's message, God's love, God's spirit, truly shape your behavior? That's the challenge presented to us today.

Next Sunday, October 6th we are having our semi-annual *Parish Blood Drive* from 8am till 2pm in the school cafeteria. Speakers from our Blood Drive Committee will be at all the Masses this weekend to encourage you to consider being a blood donor. There is always a critical need for blood so if possible, really do consider giving this great of life at the blood drive next Sunday.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), information about the Parish Blood Drive on Sunday, October 6th, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great first week of October. *Smile,* share, let Jesus be the "influencer" in your life. And remember: Life has no remote. Get up and change it yourself. God bless always.



The Doxology

Today we are in the homestretch of our journey through the Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass! At the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest prays some very special words: The Doxology. The glossary of our Catechism defines doxology as a "Christian prayer which gives praise and glory to God, often in a special way to the three divine persons of the Trinity" (CCC, 875). The Catholic Source Book tells us the word doxology comes from the Greek doxa, which means "glory." In our tradition, the Gloria can be referred to as the "Greater Doxology" and the prayer "Glory Be" the "lesser doxology" (The Catholic Source Book, p. 7). There are many doxologies found throughout our prayer, including those in the Bible. For example: "For from him and through him and for him are all things. To him be glory forever. Amen." (Romans 11:36). Another example is: "To him be glory now and to the day of eternity" (2 Peter 3:18).

Gratitude for Participation in Jesus' Offering



As for the doxology of the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest raises the chalice and paten, and sings or says: "Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, for ever and ever." As the Diocese of Peoria teaches, "These words of praise addressed to the Father summarize well the reality of what has just taken place: the sacrificial offering of the Son to the Father through the Holy Spirit" (A Study of the Mass, p. 16). For me as a priest, this is always a truly special moment where I feel an overlapping mix of unworthiness and joy. Elevating Jesus in the Eucharist above the altar, I am often struck with a sense of being allowed to participate in something truly amazing! Here is Jesus truly present, being offered to the Father through this moment in the Mass. This moment of elevation reminds me of Jesus on the Cross-lifted up, giving everything in love for us. As I hold Jesus up above the altar, I feel that the gesture is saying to God the Father:

"Here is Jesus, your Beloved Son; here is the One who loves us perfectly and gave everything for us!" Fr. Guy Oury mentions this "offering gesture" and how "the offering is that of the Son and at the same time that of the Church. The Mass is inseparably both—an offering made by Christ and by the Church. It is one through the other. The sacrifice of Christ makes possible the sacrifice of the Church and evokes it in response. The Church, to speak in figure, receives the offering from the hands of Christ. He instituted it for the Church, which presents it with him" (The Mass, p. 103). I'm often amazed at the humility of Jesus: in his generosity and love, he invites us through the priest to join in this moment of offering and praise!

United with the Church, Both on Earth and in Heaven The author of Understanding the Mass, Charles Belmonte, breaks down the words of this doxology, highlighting the ways we are invited into this moment through Jesus, "Through him: Through Jesus' mediation, we have access to God... With him: We are children of God, through the adoption Christ merited for us... In him: There is one and the same life in him and in us... In the unity of the Holy Spirit: The Church is a unity brought together by the Holy Spirit. He joins us together as believers and gives us the life of grace by which we become children of God. He dwells in us, enabling us to offer the sacrifice of praise to God, together with the entire Church" (p. 162).

This moment of the Mass brings us to the great culmination of the Eucharistic Prayer and the one perfect sacrifice of Jesus. As some saints have reminded us, in a very real way we are joined with the angels and saints in the heavenly liturgy. As Jesus is offered to the Father through the Holy Spirit, it seems that all of creation should burst forth together in praise and joy. How can we hold back in the midst of such a wonderful gift? As we will see, we all have a response at this moment that praises God: The Great Amen!

For Reflection:

 When you pray the "Glory Be," imagine the elevation of the paten and chalice during the Eucharistic Prayer, and unite your prayer with the offering of Christ.

Practical Suggestions for Practicing the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy

The Spiritual Works of Mercy are kind acts by which we help our neighbors with their everyday spiritual and emotional needs. Counseling the doubtful is an important aspect of spiritual care and involves guiding those who are uncertain or struggling with their faith, decisions, or personal challenges.

To Counsel the Doubtful:

- Be courageous yet compassionate in calling people and institutions to be faithful to Gospel values.
- Intervene in situations in which people are clearly doing harm to themselves or others.
- Respond to negative and prejudicial comments with positive statements.
- Put an end to gossip by walking away; set a good example for others.
- Listen actively and empathetically to those who are doubting by offering a compassionate ear.
- Suggest to someone weighing a decision that they spend time in prayer or meditation to seek clarity and peace. Offering to pray with them or for them can also be a supportive gesture.
- Be patient and non-judgmental with those in doubt. Understand that doubts can be a process and may take time to resolve. Approach their questions and concerns with patience and without judgment.v Be a Role Model by demonstrating faith and trust through your own actions and decisions. Your example can be a powerful witness to others who are struggling.

Disciples who see a need and fill need in living the Spiritual Works of Mercy in their life:

Parish Volunteers: Many parishioners volunteer as catechists, RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults) leaders, or spiritual mentors, offering guidance and support to those who are new to the faith or struggling with their beliefs.

Small Group Leaders: Catholics who lead Bible studies or faith-sharing groups often help others navigate their doubts and questions through discussion and shared learning.

Prayer Partners: Individuals who commit to praying for others, especially those facing crises of faith or personal difficulties, provide a source of support and spiritual counsel.

Friends and Family Members: Everyday Catholics often provide invaluable support to their loved ones by listening to their doubts and offering faith-based advice and encouragement.

Community Service Volunteers: Those who volunteer in charitable activities often counsel the doubtful by embodying the love and compassion of Christ, providing a living example of faith in action.

Retreat Leaders: Parishioners who help organize or lead retreats offer participants time for reflection, prayer, and discussion, addressing doubts and providing spiritual insight.

A Christian who is living the mission of a disciple is one who believes in Jesus, who knows Jesus, who can't live without Jesus, and who wants to share with others the love, peace, and joy that he has experienced as a result of living in relationship with Jesus.

- · Male advocates available to speak with fathers




