Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord! Today is the official end of the Christmas season and Monday we start the first segment of Ordinary Time for this liturgical year. This section will continue until Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. The feast of Jesus' baptism is an event that signals the end of Jesus' hidden years and the transition into his public ministry. In the first reading from the prophet Isaiah, the voice of John the Baptist is foretold as one who gets the people ready for the coming savior. "The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all the people shall see it together; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." Then in the second reading from Paul's Letter to Titus, the message is to let the grace of God change the behavior of the newly baptized. They should reject godless ways and live in a just and devout way while awaiting the blessed hope when Jesus will appear in glory. And finally, Luke's gospel tells of the baptism of Jesus which occurred just like all the other people who approached John the Baptist. However, after Jesus was baptized, heaven opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

As we remember something that happened on the banks of the Jordan River long ago, we are invited to remember and reflect on each of our own baptism. How do I understand it? What does it mean? What is it supposed to bring about? What difference is it supposed to make? These are questions to answer. For some of us, they have obvious life-changing implications. For others, it might just have been a kind of Hallmark moment, a sort of frozen in time milestone that we can look back on fondly as we flip through some photos or watch a video. And for others, maybe most of us, it may be something inbetween. Yet from the Church's perspective, baptism is all about identity, a spiritual rebirth in which Jesus claims us as his own and we pledge to spend a lifetime claiming Jesus as our own. Put another way, baptism in addition to washing us clean and uniting us to the death and resurrection of Jesus, is meant to lead us to ask a very important question: Who am I? Is my identity as a disciple of Jesus kept a relative secret? Do we not want others to know just how important our beliefs are, or that we love the Church, or love Jesus?

Probably from the outside looking in we don't appear very different from everyone else. There are the same priorities, the same prejudices, the same pettiness, selfishness and small-mindedness. There is the same greed, the same need for attention and praise. If we keep this identity a secret from others, are we also keeping it from ourselves? If so then the work of God will remain undone because we have only given a little, loved a little and forgiven a little. Our faith remains relatively hidden. But if we can embrace the kind of radical love God asks of us, we can be sure that our cover will be blown, and the world will be a lot more beautiful for it.

Last month we had our Christmas Cash fund raiser on Gaudete Sunday. The winning ticket was #7447 with the winning share being \$3525. Congratulations to the winner and thanks to all who took chances for the raffle. Look for our next 50/50, the Pot of Gold, which comes in March.

The new year is a good time to maybe join one of our parish ministries. How about the *Sodality of Our Lady?* Or maybe one of our music ministries like the *Adult Choir* or the *Folk Group.* We are also always looking for more volunteers for the *Ministry of Consolation* to help families prepare the Funeral Mass of their loved one. Check the bulletin for more information about these ministries. They'd love to have you!

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great First Week in Ordinary Time.

Smile, share and if you don't already know, find out the date of your own baptism. Make that date a special day of spiritual reflection. Remember:

Being a Christian doesn't mean you won't fall.

JANUARY 12, 2025-THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

FIRST READING Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins. A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low: the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken. Fraction Part 1

This week, we continue with the meaningful actions that are happening during the Lamb of God. The Roman Missal indicates that during the singing or recitation of the Lamb of God, the priest "takes the host, breaks it over the paten, and places a small piece in the chalice, saying quietly: 'May this mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it'." We call this part of the Mass the Fraction or the Breaking and the Commingling.



The Catholic Encyclopedia teaches that, "The 'Breaking,' from the Latin, fractio, is the act of breaking the bread of the species consecrated in the Mass" (Catholic Encyclopedia, p. 226), which is why the breaking is sometimes called the fracturing rite. "This rite, which is simple in its appearance, is full of ancient meaning. At the Last Supper, Jesus 'broke the bread' to distribute to the disciples. After the Resurrection, the disciples recognized Jesus in the 'Breaking of the Bread.' Both in the Acts of the Apostles and in the letters of St. Paul, the Eucharistic celebration is often referred to as 'breaking of the bread'." (A Study of the Mass, Dr. Edward Sri

notes several Scripture passages regarding "Breaking the Bread," including: Mt 14:19; 15:36; Mk 6:41; 8:6; Lk 9:16; Mt 26:26; Mk 14:22; Lk 22:19; 1 Cor 11:24; Lk 24:30; Acts 2:42, 46 (A Biblical Walk Through the Mass, pp. 132–33).

A Sign of Unity



"Breaking Bread" is a sign of our unity, together sharing in the "one loaf." Although for practicality many churches use smaller hosts for the distribution of Holy Communion, the symbolism of the fracturing reminds us that we are united together in Christ, not only in the Mass where we are but also with those present at Mass in every time and place. Another sign of unity is the Church's direction that, if possible, the faithful should receive Communion from hosts consecrated at that particular Mass. We know Christ is truly present and remains so in the hosts reserved in the tabernacle. Receiving hosts consecrated in the Mass we are participating in provides a sign of unity and also strengthens our participation in the sacrifice of Christ. (Recall from the Old Testament/Temple times that people were given a portion of the sacrifice, and their participation was completed through eating that portion).

For Reflection: Pray with one or more of the Scripture passages which feature the "Breaking of the Bread," such as Mt 14:19, 15:36, 26:26; Mk 6:41, 8:6, 14:22; Lk 9:16, 22:19, 24:30; Acts 2:42, 46; 1 Cor 11:24. Rest in your awareness of being part of the "great cloud of witnesses" united in the "Breaking of the Bread."

Eucharistic Communion and Seeing Those in Need By Dr. James Pauley, National Eucharist Revival Blog "The Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive in truth the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognize Christ in the poorest, his brethren." CCC 1397

If we are to see Jesus properly in the Eucharist, there is a certain poverty of spirit needed on our part. Many years ago, a confessor described for me how, before the Eucharist, each of us must become a "holy beggar" with our need for Jesus before us, leaning into a deeper dependence upon him. Frequently these days as I stand in line waiting to receive Jesus in the Eucharist, I am training myself to pray, "Jesus, I need you" over and over again. Repeating these simple words helps bring me into my own stark poverty before the infinitely generous gift of our Lord.

In receiving the Eucharist, then, we must see the poverty of the One who has emptied himself on our behalf. And we must ourselves seek to be poor in spirit. In this poverty, we open ourselves to truly receive the One who brings healing and new life. Such an encounter is meant to change us, to crystallize in us a new way of seeing. We become more capable of seeing others in their need and seeing Jesus as he is present, as St. Teresa of Calcutta would say, in his most "distressing disguise." This new way of seeing people, most especially those in need, is indeed a consequence of entering into Eucharistic communion with the Poor One who is love itself.

ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

There is a formidable push by those who want legalized assisted suicide for passage of NY State's "Medical Aid in Dying (MAID) bills, which would legalize assisted suicide in our state. Polls indicate that there is a strong favorability among New Yorkers for legalized assisted suicide. It is important for our Senate and Assembly representatives to hear from us. Maintaining the physician's role and their patients' healers. Protecting vulnerable people from financial, psychological or other pressures to end their lives. Avoiding a slide towards euthanasia. The Court of Appeals was right in its 2017 decision. The State Legislature should leave the existing ban on assisted suicide in place. Please make the calls to your representatives.

The St. Raymond's CYO Basketball organization also donated additional food that they collected from their food drive.


The Food Pantry staff and clients sincerely thank the CYO Basketball coaches and teams for their continued support which allows us to continue to help our clients.


