Father Chuck's Corner

Merry Christmas! From the Fourth Sunday of Advent, we move quickly to Christmas Eve on Tuesday and then to Christmas Day on Wednesday, December 25th. No matter where you live or happen to be, the Christmas story is loudly being proclaimed. And no matter what difficulties our world faces, if you are Christian, you must grapple a bit on how best to respond to the Christmas story. It is a unique gift giving time as we receive gifts on someone else's birthday-namely that of Jesus Christ! But any gift we receive pales in comparison to the gift of Jesus being born into our world and becoming our Lord, Savior and King.

There really is a different feel to the Christmas season and even in the weeks leading up to it. Our whole environment looks different. The streets look different. Stores and restaurants look different. Churches look different. Even people look different. Many of us seem to be a little happier during this time. We become more generous and helpful and charitable during these weeks. We make more time for each other, and especially for our of town guests. It's as if the changes we see around actually change us a little on the inside. Some of our thoughts and attitudes and personality traits change even for just a short time. It's a shame, though, that it comes to an end. But does it have to? Think about it. What we celebrate is not simply Jesus' birthday. What we celebrate is his birth into a family, into a community, into a broken world, and into each and every human heart that is open to the life he wants to put into each one of us. That's the true miracle of Christmas, that our God is not far off somewhere, disinterested and removed from his creation. Rather, the mindblowing reality is that God wants to be close to us. intimate with us, in a loving relationship with us, even to dwell within us. This is an incredible gift. Our God isn't out there somewhere. He is among us and within us.

So, Christmas is not a collection of external things that remind us we are in the month of December. Rather, Christmas should look like a world that embraces the Incarnation, men and women able to recognize the presence of Jesus all over the place. God doesn't just lie in a manger in Bethlehem. He is reborn into the hearts and lives of all who make room for him.

So, open the door to Jesus, and give him a manger to lie in-namely you! Then don't look for Christmas to end. Oh yes, the season ends, and the externals are put away, but every day of our lives can look like Christmas if we have the faith that can see Jesus just about everywhere. And when that happens, when we recognize Jesus in the person standing before us, the world will become a little kinder, a little more merciful, a little more compassionate. In other words, it will start to become the world God wanted all along. One more thing. As you try to see Jesus in people during the coming year, don't forget to also look for him within yourself. He is there too, ready to help you be the beautiful person you were created to be. And that's a miracle every one of us needs. *Have* a blessed, joyful Jesus-centered Christmas, not just on the 25th, but every day.

I want to thank all those who continue to be generous to St. Raymond Parish, even when times are tough. We always need the financial boost that comes from many parishioners at Christmas. 



Exchanging the Sign of Peace - Part 2

Continuing from last week, how do we exchange the sign of peace? According to local custom, we exchange with one another a sign of peace. Typically, in the United States, the normative gesture is a handshake to those around us" (Diocese of Peoria: A Study of the Mass, p. 18).

Practical Gestures of Peace

While the deeper meaning of this gesture may be more clear for us, the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) included a new paragraph addressing the practical gesture itself, which says, "As for the actual sign of peace to be given, the manner is to be established by the Conferences of Bishops in accordance with the culture and customs of the peoples. However, it is appropriate that each person, in a sober manner, offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest" (GIRM, 82).



So, what is the norm for us? While we don't have a defined standard, as mentioned previously, our typical local norm is a simple handshake with people that are nearby. Certainly, spouses, families, and others may have more intimate exchanges of peace such as a hug or a kiss. During times when people are being more cautious about illness and contact, a simple bow or a wave and a smile can be fine gestures of peace as well. Generally, I would encourage people to choose the sign that is

comfortable for people around us. The main thing we want to remember is to make the gesture a real sign of peace, while at the same time not being too carefree or moving throughout the church, where we might risk being disrespectful to Jesus present on the altar (which is also why we shouldn't have conversations at this time).



For a few more summary thoughts, the Diocese of Peoria says, "This rite of peace acknowledges a few things: forgiveness, humility and community. In Matthew, Chapter 5, our Lord taught us we must first be reconciled with one another before approaching the altar. We approach the altar to receive the Prince of Peace; His command is that we be peacemakers ourselves by forgiving others and asking pardon for our sins... It is also a gesture of the communal Spirit which resides in the Church. The gesture of peace signifies this 'ecclesial bond' that with Christ we are a community of believers and children of the same Father" (A Study of the Mass, p. 18). The next time you offer the Sign of Peace at Mass, whether a hug, kiss, handshake, simple bow, wave, or smile, think about what it truly means-what you truly want to offer to those around you-and how it helps prepare your heart for Jesus truly present in Holy Communion.

For Reflection: As part of your preparation the next time you participate in Mass, pray Psalm 122, which celebrates the gift of worshipping in God's "house" and includes the phrase, "Peace be with you."

PILLAR 2 - EUCHARISTIC IDENTITY

Practical Suggestions for Practicing the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy

The Spiritual Work of Mercy to bear wrongs patiently invites us to practice patience, forgiveness, and humility in the face of harm or injustice. Here are suggestions for you to actively live out this mercy:

To Bear Wrongs Patiently:

- Remember Christ's example: Reflect on how Jesus bore the wrongs of others-especially His suffering on the cross-and use His example as strength to bear your own trials patiently.
- Respond with calmness: When someone wrongs you, instead of reacting in anger or frustration, take a deep breath and respond calmly, maintaining your peace.
- Pray for those who wrong you: Ask God to help you forgive and understand the person who has hurt you. Prayer softens hearts and helps you grow in compassion.
- Practice forgiveness in your heart: Even if the wrongdoer does not ask for forgiveness, choose to forgive them in your heart. Let go of grudges.
- Offer it up for others: When enduring wrong, offer the suffering as a prayer for others in need, whether they are in spiritual, physical, or emotional distress.
- Be patient with their flaws: Recognize that everyone has weaknesses and that wrongs are often a result of personal struggles or imperfections. Extend mercy by allowing them room to grow.
- Let go of the need to be right: Sometimes, bearing wrongs patiently means letting go of your need to "win" the argument or prove that you're right. Prioritize peace and reconciliation.

The Spiritual Works of Mercy in Real Life

"You have heard that it was said, 'Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.' But I tell you, do not resist an evil person. If anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to them the other cheek also." Matthew 5:38 YOU DID IT TO ME: BEAR WRONGS PATIENTLY by Michele Fritz

Recently someone told me that Matthew 5:38-39 shows how weak Christians are. He told me that people should be able to retaliate when they have been hurt. When you retaliate you show your strength. But does this verse show weakness or does it show incredible strength and fortitude? When we struggle to forgive others or to bear wrongs patiently, we simply need to look at the cross to know it is possible to forgive even the most terrible injustices that others commit against us. Christ, fully human, felt all the emotions we feel. And yet, as He hung painfully, dying on the cross, He prayed, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34) Through this simple prayer He showed us how we should react when we too are wrongly punished, ridiculed, or blamed.

Forgiving doesn't mean that what someone else did to you is ok or that you won't protect yourself from it happening again; but it means you are letting go of the hurt so that you can heal. Likewise, when we bear wrongs patiently, we are not saying that we deserve to be treated poorly or that we even accept that treatment. When we bear wrongs patiently, we are saying that we know God will bring good from the pain we are experiencing and that we are willing to allow Him the time He needs to do exactly that. We are saying we want to model the love Christ showed to us when He forgave those who persecuted Him.




