Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Easter blessings be yours on the Sixth Sunday of Easter! Each of today's readings puts God's love at the center of its message. In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we see Peter advocating that Gentiles are also favored by God and can receive the Holy Spirit. "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people, who have received the Holy Spirit even as we have? He ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ." Then in the second reading from 1 John, we are told that any talk of God or expression of love that does not include God is shallow. "Whoever is without love does not know love, for God is love." And finally, John's gospel continues the theme from last Sunday by teaching that when we remain in God's love and love one another our joy will be complete. The result of Jesus' teaching is summed up in his great command: "Love one another."

All of us have had particular experiences when we have felt God's love, including through the love of others. Maybe it came from a parent, a dear friend or spouse. It might be the love we have felt when we take a moment to feel gratitude for the blessings in our lives. The gospel passage shines a light on how divine love shows itself to us. Jesus wants his disciples to start with their experience of his love to them. They witnessed his love when he spoke words of hope to people on the margins and when he healed the sick. They witnessed his love when he chose them to share his message with others. Now he wants then to take the love they have witnessed and practice it in their lives with those around them. The Easter season is 50 days for a reason. Lent was 40 days of preparing our hearts for Jesus' death and resurrection. The message of Easter is an ongoing understanding of what it means that Jesus has risen from the dead. It shapes our whole being and is at the center of our Christian calling. The Easter season is not over; let us continue to open ourselves up to experiences of God's love. Remain in it and share it with others. And that includes all people. Remember that God is the God of everybody, and he belongs to everyone. Treat each other with a little more understanding, a little more kindness, and a little more respect. After all, since God is love, that's really all we should be about. In this Eucharist pray for the grace to strengthen your friendship with God.

I am very happy to announce that as of May 1, 2024, Father Joseph Rwamwenge has been officially assigned as an Associate Pastor at St. Raymond Parish. I have known Father Joseph for 25 years and you have known him as a frequent visitor to our parish for the past 13 years. We have all benefited from Father Joseph's priestly ministry and friendship these past years. The journey to be assigned here has been a long one but finally it has happened. On behalf of all our parishioners, I officially welcome you, Father Joseph, to St. Raymond Parish (your home away from home.) May you have many fruitful and happy years with us.

On Tuesday, May 7th we will have a *Holy Hour* starting at 7:30pm which will include Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, prayer, scripture, reflection, music and Benediction. All are most welcome to spend this time with Jesus. And then on Friday, May 10th, there will be a *Fatima Prayer Vigil* from 7-8:30pm in the church. Again, all are invited to spend this time in honor of our Blessed Lady, as we experience the life-giving and loving presence of her Son, Jesus in the Eucharist. Come and pray for Our Lady's intercession this coming Friday.

ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

In North Carolina, twin girls were expected to be born on April 9, 2020. Instead, to the parents surprise, the girls arrived early, on December 8, 2019. The prognosis for their survival was not good. The parents were told that babies born before 23 weeks usually don't survive. The girls weighed a little more than one pound each and they were breathing. Medical attention was immediately given to the little ones and overcoming many obstacles, the babies survived, thrived and were eventually brought home. "My two babies came out alive and looked fully formed.....Babies this small can survive and are a real life...It has been a long, draining journey...I feel blessed. They are a creation of God and I have watched them develop outside the womb" (Tracey Hernandez, the twin's mother) Recent studies out of Duke University and the New England Journal of Medicine have found a growing percent of premature infants are surviving as early as 22 weeks. The British Assn. of Medicine has issued guideline encouraging medical treatment for babies born at 22 weeks of pregnancy. Previously, the guidelines did not recommend treatment until 24 weeks. The standard procedure was to deny live babies born before 24 weeks medical treatment which would result in the baby's death. (lifenews.com) Real health care involving a pregnancy should provide medical treatment for both human lives involved - mother and baby. Abortion is not health care. It is the intention killing of an innocent human life. Mother and baby deserve better. If you or someone you know needs help with a distressing pregnancy, please do not rush to make a quick decision, give yourself time, contact the following number to get important information that will help bot h you and your baby. Offertory Water and Wine

As we continue through the Offertory, this time we take a closer look at some of the prayers at the altar as the bread and wine are placed there. After the bread and wine are brought forward, they are placed on the altar by the priest (or a deacon if there is one present). Then the priest, speaking either silently or aloud, says the prayers over the bread and wine. These are the prayers that begin, "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands, it will become for us the bread of life."

You may also recognize the prayer as the priest holds the chalice: "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become our spiritual drink." As the Diocese of Peoria reminds us, "If there is no music playing, [the priest] may do this out loud. In this case, we would respond to these prayers by saying, 'Blessed be God forever!' These prayers are ancient and have profound meaning. We place before him in our procession 'our' gifts, yet in these formulas we immediately admit that while they are 'work of human hands' they are still ultimately from God. For this reason, we bless God for his goodness and ask him to accept and transform the gifts into 'bread of life' and 'spiritual drink" (A Study of the Mass, p. 11).

The Mystery of the Water and Wine

As the priest is preparing the wine, the Diocese of Peoria continues, "notice that he places a small amount of water into the chalice with the wine. As he does this he says: 'By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.' The Church maintains this very ancient custom of mixing water and wine as it uniquely symbolizes what we pray for. At the Mass, we offer our lives in union with Christ. In all our weakness, in all our smallness, we pray to be inseparably united to the divine. The small drops of water symbolize us. As the water becomes inseparably

united to the wine, we pray we may become inseparably united to Jesus Christ" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 11-12). Along these lines, the author, Charles Belmonte teaches, "It was ancient custom to take the wine mixed with water, which the chalice of Jesus in the Last Supper contained. The Church retained this gesture to symbolize the sanctification of the Christian which is accomplished through his union with Jesus Christ. The water becomes the symbol of ourselves: our lives, with our weaknesses. Have you stopped to think what happens to the drops of water mixed with the wine? They are absorbed by it and then become inseparable from it. So does Jesus absorb us. The drops of water are of negligible worth; they are not even enough to quench anyone's thirst. Yet they will end up being divine blood! And all that because they let themselves be mixed with the wine and be dissolved in it, thus manifesting self-denial, personal renunciation. At this moment, we grow in our desire to offer ourselves in total self-surrender, as the few drops of water in the chalice have reminded us. So, we will be able to become one with Jesus Christ after the Consecration" (Understanding the Mass, p.

^{114).} An Offering of Spiritual Gifts

What a meaningful moment in this part of the Mass! A transition time in the Mass that could be easily missed, these brief prayers sometimes said silently provide a great invitation for prayer:

Jesus, help my heart to unite more perfectly with yours. I feel at times so far from you, but you give of yourself so that I have this opportunity to be more closely united with you. Help me to be attentive in this moment and bring my heart joy from knowing you will soon be truly present on the altar, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, in the Eucharist!

For Reflection:

- Make Father Luke's prayer above your own as you participate more fully in the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
- Next time you participate in Mass, pay close attention to the preparation of the chalice and the mixing of water and wine. Make an act of faith, trusting that Jesus can and will receive all you offer him and transform your weakness into strength by his divine power.

Servant of God Charlene Marie Richard Laywoman (†1959)

Charlene Richard, a 12-year old Cajun girl from rural Louisiana, lived what could be considered a good but average life. The devout Catholic girl received good grades, did farm chores, played sports, and said her Rosary nightly. However, it was her sanctity during her suffering with acute lymphatic leukemia that has inspired many and is comparable to that of her idol, St. Thérèse of Lisieux. What can we learn from her Eucharistic witness?

Belief Intensifies Love: As Charlene dealt with leukemia, she remained a pillar of joyful support for her family and her community. Her acceptance of her remaining time bloomed into a beautiful catalyst for God's power. Charlene's life shows us that pain, whether it be physical, emotional, or spiritual, is truly a gift from God, as it gives us the opportunity to imitate Christ in His Passion and death.

Feeding and Being Fed by Love: Charlene's introduction to the Eucharist proved fruitful. Taught by the chaplain of hospital of merits of redemptive suffering, each day, Charlene would ask the chaplain, "Who am I to suffer for today?" Both the chaplain and the director of pediatrics at the hospital, noticed a sudden influx of miraculous healings and conversions to the Catholic faith as Charlene prayed. By the grace of God, she had taken her suffering and her crisis and created an astoundingly beautiful channel of prayer for others.

Made for Love: The overriding lesson of Charlene's story is in the words of Christ Himself in the Lord's Prayer: "Thy will be done." Rather than viewing suffering as something to complain about, we can look at it as not only an opportunity for growth in our relationship with God, but also a way to help others as Charlene did.





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My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Long Island is blessed to be home to several of the nation's most renowned healthcare systems. These systems consist of a vast network of physicians, nurses, technicians, and medical professionals of all kinds who live and work in our communities. In my weekly travels across the Diocese of Rockville Centre, I meet so many of these health professionals and I never fail to be inspired by their commitment to accompanying their patients throughout the courses of their lives. This includes the end of life.

However, legislation pending in Albany seeks to upend the doctor-patient relationship at its most vulnerable moment via physician-assisted suicide. The bill, which seems to be gaining momentum, authorizes doctors (whose careers are dedicated to healing and preserving life) to dispense pills that literally poison patients who have been given terminal diagnoses. Such a practice flies in the face of human dignity.

In fact, a groundbreaking new Vatican document approved in April by Pope Francis, titled—appropriately— Dignitas Infinita (Infinite Dignity), specifically singles out euthanasia and assisted suicide as grave assaults on human dignity which utilize "a mistaken understanding of human dignity to turn the concept of dignity against itself."

This comment refers directly to the euphemism "death with dignity" that promoters of assisted suicide favor. *Dignitas Infinita* notes that, even in serious infirmity, "human life carries a dignity that must always be upheld, that can never be lost, and that calls for unconditional respect. Indeed, there are no circumstances under which human life would cease from being dignified and could, as a result, be put to an end."

Clearly, Pope Francis views euthanasia and assisted suicide as symptoms of what he repeatedly has called a "throwaway culture" that has taken hold in the West. The pope, in his wisdom, sees what many supporters of this practice do not.

By virtue of their very humanity, people who are ill or who lack self-sufficiency never cease being infinitely valuable, even if society sends them a message to the contrary by urging them to "get out of the way" and end their lives.

What is being peddled by advocates as a last resort for those suffering from interminable pain will very quickly be expanded to resemble the dystopian nightmare we are seeing play out in Canada, which passed a law very similar to the New York bill in 2016 but which already has been expanded to allow people with non-terminal diagnoses to end their lives. In March, an Ottawa judge approved assisted suicide for a young woman whose only diagnoses are autism and ADHD, over her parents' pleading objection. The Canadian law is set to expand again in 2027 – incredibly – to allow people with mental illnesses like depression, anorexia, or bipolar disorder to access suicide pills as prescribed by a medical professional.



Sadly, Canada is not an isolated case. The situation is similar in the Netherlands, the first nation to approve euthanasia, where people living with autism and intellectual disabilities reportedly are being euthanized.

I know that these scenarios are not what people have in mind when they answer a survey question asking if they support "medical aid in dying" or "death with dignity." But we must not fool ourselves. What I'm

describing is not fiction or fear mongering; these abuses are really happening today in jurisdictions that have legalized assisted suicide.

The medical professionals whom I speak with in our parishes and at Catholic Health medical facilities understand clearly that assisted suicide is a terrible, untenable policy. They know that when the end-of-life approaches, the answer is not to actively kill patients or to help them to kill themselves. Instead, true dignity is upheld by providing compassionate palliative care which manages patients' pain and other symptoms, keeps them clean, tends to their bodily needs, and spiritually prepares them for their journey home.

As Pope Francis has said, "We must accompany people towards death, but not provoke death or facilitate any form of suicide...Life is a right, not death, which must be welcomed, not administered."

During this time when we celebrate a National Eucharistic Revival, we pray that our reverence for the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ may inspire our witness in New York State's public square to the reverence for the sanctity of human life at every stage of life.



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
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
