

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours as we begin a new Church liturgical year on this First **Sunday of Advent!** We start the new year focusing on preparing for Christmas and for the return of Jesus at the Second Coming. Hope, light, joy and "holy waiting" are all words used to describe the spiritual movements of these four weeks. The first reading from the prophet Jeremiah foretells the fulfillment of God's promise. "I will raise up for David a just shoot; he shall do what is right and just in the land." Then in Paul's Letter to the Thessalonians, the new believers are encouraged to practice love for one another in anticipation of Jesus' return. And finally, Luke's gospel gives a resounding warning to be prepared for Jesus' return, which is described as a spectacular event. "There will be signs in the sun, the moon and the stars, and on earth nations will be in dismay; perplexed by the roaring of the sea and the waves." Every Advent is a time to prepare for our own journey to Bethlehem, and also as we await the return of the Son of Man. We should take a serious look at our practices and consider how we can grow closer to God. There are so many ways to do that. Dedicate some special time each day to prayer. Reconnect with a loved one. Start some new act of service. All can be good and fruitful ways of preparing, both for Christmas and for Jesus' Second Coming.

Think about this. God made promises. He promised to always be faithful to the people of Israel. He promised after the flood to never destroy the world again out of anger. And he promised to send us a savior. It's incredible to think of God, who owes us absolutely nothing, to make promises. But our God doesn't act like that. He wants us to believe in him, to know him, trust him and hope in him. He wants us to find security and peace in him. And he wants us to understand that we can count on him to fulfill his promises, not once in a while, but always. Advent is the time when we once again await the fulfillment of God's greatest promise- his complete entry into our world in the person of Jesus, his Son. All his promises before led to God's plan of the gift of his Son, Jesus. Yet, God's plan is not truly complete, so we also look for the day when Jesus will return to bring to completion what God has prepared for us and all of creation. Advent is just the beginning.

We await the fulfillment of an incredible promise from God, a promise fully realized in the gift of his Son. This shows powerfully how much God loves us and does absolutely everything for us. We don't have to wonder if God can be counted on. But I do wonder if God can count on us? Use the weeks of Advent to reflect on God's promises, rejoice in his greatest promise-Jesus. But also consider what you might be willing to promise to God. Make your Advent go both ways.

As we move through the season of Advent, there are some parish events to be aware of. One is the annual *Christmas Plant Sale*. We have an array of beautiful Christmas plants to purchase that will enhance your holiday decorations. Use the order form found in the bulletin. Fill it out and return it to the rectory by next Sunday, December 8th. We also have our Christmas Cash 50/50 happening right now. Chances are \$10 each and three for \$25. Use the order form found in the bulletin or stop by the rectory during office hours. Don't miss out on a chance to win some big money for the holidays. Finally, don't forget the "Giving Tree," sponsored by Parish Social Ministry starting this weekend. Take a card from the tree after Mass and buy a gift to help make someone's Christmas a little brighter this year.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. 

The Rite of Peace Part 1

After the Our Father and Embolism, as The General Instruction for the Roman Missal says, "There follows the Rite of Peace, by which the Church entreats peace and unity for herself and for the whole human family, and the faithful express to each other their ecclesial communion and mutual charity before communicating in the Sacrament" (GIRM, 82). At this point in the Mass, the priest prays, "Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever." The people then reply, "Amen."

What True Peace Is-and What It's Not

What is true peace? Perhaps we could go to various definitions. Our Catechism says, "Peace is not merely the absence of war, and is not limited to maintaining a balance of powers" (CCC, 2304). The Catechism continues with a quotation from St. Augustine, who wrote that peace is "the tranquility of order" (CCC, 2304). "Earthly peace is the image and fruit of the peace of Christ, the messianic 'Prince of Peace.' By the blood of his Cross... he reconciled men with God and made his Church the sacrament of the unity of the human race and of its union with God. 'He is our peace' [Eph 2:14]" (CCC, 2305). As Edward Sri, the author of A Biblical Walk Through the Mass, writes, "Many people seek the security and peace of this world, which is a peace based on success, on everything going well, on avoiding problems and suffering. But this kind of peace is quite fragile and fleeting... Christ, however, offers us a deeper, longer lasting peace-one that the world does not give. When we allow Jesus to be the foundation of our lives and live according to his plan for us, he gives us an internal, spiritual peace that can withstand life's many disappointments, trials, and sufferings. This is the kind of peace of heart that also builds true unity within marriages, families, communities, parishes, and nations. And this is what the priest prays for at this moment of the liturgy" (p. 130-31).

Hopefully, we have had moments of true peace in our hearts that remind us of how generously Jesus has



loved us. For anyone who hasn't, the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist certainly invites us to that peace for which we long. As we prepare to receive the Prince of Peace truly present in Holy Communion, perhaps it seems fitting that the Rite of Peace occurs at this moment in the Mass. According to Charles Belmonte, "When we pronounce our 'Amen,' we must realize that we are asking not only for our personal peace but also for peace for the whole Church... During the Last Supper, our Lord made his disciples aware of the importance of peace, the fruit of charity. Many times he spoke of unity, of the spirit of service, of humility, of charity. These are virtues and dispositions of the soul which can thrive only in an atmosphere of peace." (Understanding the Mass, pp. 173–74).



Peace As Preparation for Communion

So, without a doubt, peace is an ardent desire and need for us as Christian people. This is true at all times of our lives, but especially at the Holy Mass. In the Mass, there are many wonderful gifts and graces; we certainly are going to receive those graces more fruitfully if our hearts are at peace and open to Christ, as opposed to being distracted and upset over things that happen to us. This is most true when the time for Holy Communion comes. We are preparing to receive the most wonderful gift: we can't have a distracted heart! So, we make sure, by a prayer and a gesture, that we really are ready to go forward to receive Our Lord.*

For Reflection: Consider St. Augustine's description of peace as "the tranquility of order." Pray with a Scripture passage that describes the peace of the ordered city or kingdom of God, such as Isaiah 32, Isaiah 54, Psalm 122, or Revelation 21.

Now that we have introduced the Four Pillars of Mission, we now offer ideas on how to apply them to your life.

PILLAR 2 - EUCHARISTIC IDENTITY

Practical Suggestions for Practicing the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy

The Corporal Works of Mercy are kind acts by which we help our neighbors with their everyday material and physical needs. To bury the dead involves showing respect, care, and love for those who have passed away by providing proper and dignified care for their remains and honoring their memory.

To Bury the Dead:

- Pray for the Deceased: Offer prayers for the repose of the souls of the deceased, asking God to grant them eternal peace.
- Support the Grieving Family: Provide emotional, spiritual, and practical support to grieving family members, helping them with tasks like meals or childcare.
- Assist with Funeral Arrangements: Help families make funeral arrangements, ensuring that the deceased is properly cared for and given a respectful service.
- Attend Wakes and Funerals: Participate in the funeral services of others, offering prayers for the deceased and supporting the grieving family.
- Organize Masses for the Dead: Coordinate or sponsor Masses to be said for the souls of the deceased, ensuring that their souls are prayed for by the Church.
- Donate to Charities in Their Memory: Give to charitable causes or organizations in memory of the deceased, especially those that align with the person's values or wishes.
- Volunteer with Funeral Ministries: Volunteer with St. Raymond Parish's Bereavement Ministry to assist grieving families through funeral liturgy preparation, wake service, and funeral liturgy.
